

# Community

#### **Cook County**

Our four locations along Central Avenue in Northfield continue to be at capacity as we meet the needs of community members through our various clinical programs.

The new Josselyn Headquarters is now located at 1135 Skokie Boulevard in Northbrook. Josselyn continues to prepare this new 57,000 sq. ft space for:

- · An expanded teen Intensive Outpatient Program, doubling the size of our current footprint
- · A community training center for Mental Health First Aid and clinical continuing education
- Two floors of therapy and psychiatry services for children, adolescents, adults, families, and groups

#### Lake County

Josselyn has continued to expand its presence in Lake County. Sixteen percent of respondents in Waukegan and North Chicago reported 14 or more of the prior 30 days during which their mental health was not good.\*

Josselyn remains focused on reducing all barriers to care: financial, cultural, racial, linguistic, and stigma.

- Of 42 staff in Waukegan who are serving Lake County residents, 12 are bilingual and 25 are of color.
- · Of our Lake County clients, 25% are Latinx, 13% are African American, and 43% are age 18 or younger.

# Specialized

### Teen Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP)

Social and educational disruptions during the COVID-19 pandemic have exacerbated concerns about adolescents' mental health and suicidal behavior.

A 2021 CDC survey indicates that 37.1% of U.S. high school students reported poor mental health during the COVID-19 pandemic, with 19.9% considering and 9% attempting suicide in the preceding year.\*

Josselyn's new Teen IOP launched in FY22 with a pilot of 31 teens. This program, designed for 12- to 18-year-olds in 7th to 12th grades, provides a higher level of care than weekly therapy. Josselyn's Teen IOP is a critical service in this region.









### Camp Neeka

Josselyn's Camp Neeka is a month-long summer therapeutic day camp for youth ages 8 to 12. Campers experience games, sports, art, dance, crafts, and field trips.

Along with these typical summer camp experiences, and with guidance from trained counselors, children learn how to solve problems, navigate conflict, and manage their emotions and behaviors. Campers change their own self-perceptions and improve social interactions, which therefore has an impact on them year-round.

#### The need for Camp Neeka

- 44% of young children experienced an increase in mental or behavioral health symptoms since the pandemic\*
- We hosted 35 campers supported by 18 staff who are college/ post grad students in counseling, psychology, or education and led by clinicians

### Mental Health First Aid (MHFA)

Josselyn continues to be a leader regionally with MHFA trainings. These "CPR for the brain" trainings teach participants how to:

- identify
- understand
- · respond to

signs of mental illness and substance use disorders, and how to refer people to help.

#### Josselyn is present in:

- schools
- corporations
- · community organizations
- civic organizations

In the last fiscal year, we trained about 950 adults and teens

- 96% of MHFA participants feel more confident starting a difficult conversation about mental health
- 94% of MHFA participants better understand how to recognize the signs/symptoms of a mental health challenge
- 98% of MHFA participants have a better understanding of resources in the community

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
